PROPOSITION P

INFORMATION

This April, the voters of St. Louis City and County will be asked to increase funding to protect natural areas and wildlife habitat, improve local parks and trails, as well as increase safety and accessibility at the Gateway Arch. The Safe and Accessible Arch and Public Parks Initiative on the April 2, 2013 ballot asks voters to consider increasing the sales tax by 3/16 of one cent. This is less than 2 cents on a \$10 purchase with exemptions for food and prescription drugs.

The funds from the measure would be used to: Provide more funds for municipal and countv park improvements, maintenance and safety; preserve natural areas and improve local trails for walking, jogging and biking; increase safety and security across the Gateway Arch grounds; and increase allowing visitors with accessibility disabilities, families with young children and the elderly easier and safer access to the Arch grounds and the Mississippi riverfront.

If approved, each year, a total of \$31.4 million of additional revenue will be available for parks, trails, and improvement of the Arch grounds. In St. Louis County, an additional \$6 million would be available annually for county park improvements and an additional \$4 million would be available to improve municipal parks.

Since 2000, the City of Oakland has received more than \$150,089 in funding for park projects from the existing regional park and trail improvement program. Municipal parks in St. Louis County have already received \$33.2 million since the existing program was approved by the voters in 2000. If the Safe and Accessible Arch and Public Parks Initiative is approved by voters, municipalities like Oakland can expect future funding for city parks.

If approved by the voters in April, it is estimated by Development Strategies, a local economic impact consultant, that the initiative will create 530 construction jobs across the region each year for three years, in addition to 4,400 permanent jobs for each year thereafter.

The initiative mandates accountability measures to ensure that funds are used as intended by the initiative. There will be full public disclosure of how the funds are spent through an independent annual audit. These funds are restricted and can only be used for park purposes. A capital improvements plan has been adopted by Great Rivers Greenway that spells out in detail exactly how funds will be used for the Arch grounds and park and trail improvements. The tax increase would not be permanent and would only be in effect for 20 years unless voters agreed to reauthorize it.

Sewer Lateral Repair Program

The City of Oakland offers residents a Sewer Lateral Repair Program. If you think you have a collapsed pipe, contact a plumber and have the line cabled at your expense. Once you have received the tape, contact City Building Inspector Greg Hanser. He will review the tape to verify your eligibility. If eligible, the resident decides on a contractor to do the repair and then pays for the repair in full. Copies of the actual bill and receipt of payment can be sent to P. O. Box 220511, St. Louis, MO 63122 and reimbursement (up to \$2500) will be sent to you after approved at the next Board meeting.

Permits Required in Oakland

Just a spring reminder to all residents in Oakland, the City requires permits to be issued for projects in the City and our own City staff review the permit applications and perform inspections. You can go to our website at www.oaklandmo.org. or call our Code Enforcement Officer Greg Hanser at 420-7481 for information. Failing to obtain a permit before the project starts may lead to fines and penalties. Repeat offenses may lead to even higher fines and penalties. We are trying to assure that all projects within the city limits of Oakland meet code and will keep our community housing up to the highest values.

City Street Sweeping

Our spring street sweeping is scheduled for April 15, please remember to keep cars off the street that day. Signs will be posted as a reminder. Please also remember not to blow or rake leaves or yard waste into the street, as equipment is not designed for leaf pick-up. Yard waste is picked up by Waste Management as a part of City trash service.





KITCHEN FIRE SAFETY ALERT

Your Kirkwood/Oakland Fire Department wants you to know that the kitchen can be one of the most hazardous rooms in the house if you don't practice safe cooking behaviors. In the past several months the fire department has responded to several cooking fires that resulted in serious injuries. Cooking equipment, most often a range or stovetop, is the leading cause of reported home fires and home fire injuries in the United States. Due to these recent incidents involving residents suffering burns in cooking fires, the fire department would like to remind you of some Kitchen Safety Rules.

Safe Cooking Behaviors

- The leading cause of fires in the kitchen is unattended cooking. Stay in the kitchen when you are frying, grilling, or broiling food. If you leave the kitchen for even a short period of time, turn off the stove.
- ☐ If you are simmering, baking, roasting, or boiling food, check it regularly, remain in the home while food is cooking, and use a timer to remind you that you're cooking.
- Keep anything that can catch fire potholders, oven mitts, wooden utensils, paper or plastic bags, food packaging, towels, or curtains away from your stovetop.
- Wear short, close-fitting or tightly rolled sleeves when cooking. *Loose clothing can dangle onto stove burners and catch fire if it comes into contact with a gas flame or electric burner.*

If You Do Have a Cooking Fire

- In case of an oven fire, turn off the heat and keep the door closed to prevent flames from burning you or your clothing. Call 9-1-1 after you leave the residence.
- If you have a fire in your microwave oven, turn it off immediately and keep the door closed. Never open the door until the fire is completely out. Unplug the appliance if you can safely reach the outlet. Call 9-1-1 after you leave the residence.
- When in doubt, just get out. When you leave, close the door behind you to help contain the fire. Call 9-1-1 after you leave the residence.
- If your clothes catch fire, stop, drop and roll. Stop, drop to the ground and cover your face with your hands. Roll over and over or back and forth to put out the fire. Immediately cool the burn with cool water for 3 to 5 minutes and cover with a clean, dry cloth. Don't apply creams, ointments, sprays or other home remedies. Call 9-1-1.

Admission Policies: The Aquatic Center is only available to residents of Glendale, Kirkwood and Oakland. For entry into the pool, you will need to present a Kirkwood Parks and Recreation issued ID card. No other form of ID will be accepted to gain admittance into the facility. ID cards are \$5 each, both for originals and replacements, and are good for up to three years. In order to obtain an ID card, each purchaser, 16 and over, must present a valid and current Missouri Driver's License (or State of Missouri ID card), showing resident address and a current utility bill (gas, water, electric, or phone), bank statement, or voter ID card, issued to their home address within the last three months. Purchasers age 15 and under must be accompanied by a person at the same address who can present the documents listed above. Each ID card holder will be allowed up to 4 guests per day, with a maximum allowance of 16 guests per family each day. All guests will pay non-resident daily admission fees.
